2020: An unprecedented year

Throughout Save the Children's more than one-hundred-year history, pragmatism has always been the guiding principle when providing assistance in humanitarian crisis situations. In fact, pragmatic assistance was the driver behind the founding of Save the Children in 1919.

However, in 2020 we were confronted with completely new dimensions in this respect. Suddenly, after seeing ourselves exclusively in the role of helpers, we found ourselves taking the role of the people affected, in the middle of a global crisis. As in every sector, the Covid-19 pandemic had a significant impact on how we work at Save the Children, how we implement our projects for disadvantaged children, and how we can often make the crucial difference between life and death.

Both in Switzerland and in our project countries, we succeeded in assisting children during the biggest humanitarian crisis of the 21st century. By quickly adapting our projects and working methods to the rapidly changing framework, and through innovative approaches to solutions, we were able to master the challenges that arose. In Switzerland, for example, we supported more than a thousand refugee children in asylum centres with learning and play sets and, for those in quarantine, provided them with specially developed quarantine boxes with instructions for activities and ideas for games (see page 15). In this way, at least a minimal degree of normality could be created for these often traumatised children. In our projects abroad, we provided much-needed education, supported fragile health systems by running clinics, and distributed food to families whose livelihoods had disappeared from one day to the next.

We believe that every child deserves an environment in which they can grow up and develop in a safe and healthy way. Our projects made an important contribution to the year, whether in the crisis regions of Syria or Yemen, on refugee routes in northeast Africa or in the slums of Kenya.

In financial terms, we were able to count on the enormous solidarity and loyalty of our supporters. Save the Children Switzerland received donations and project funding amounting to CHF 25 million in 2020. This enabled us to initiate or implement projects in 39 countries in the reporting year.

We would like to express our heartfelt thanks to all of the people and organisations who generously supported us during this extraordinary year. Only together can we achieve our ambitious goals for disadvantaged children in Switzerland and around the world. Every child should be able to survive, learn and be protected.

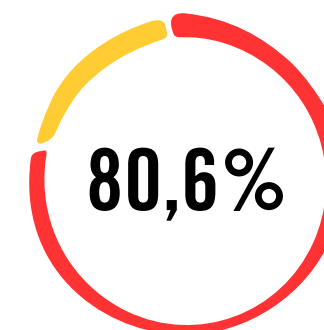

March – Covid-19: Rapid response is required

The Covid-19 pandemic is disproportionately affecting the poorest and most vulnerable – and children are also suffering tremendously. The biggest challenge for us was to respond quickly and develop innovative solutions to reach disadvantaged children in our project countries, despite the restrictions. For example, we quickly adapted the processes in our early childhood development project in rural Mali. In this project, children are taught by local employees in the village communities. To deliver important hygiene measures and education about Covid-19 to children and their families, we adapted the lessons at short notice and also involved parents, to provide information to even more people

April – savethechildren.ch gets a makeover

Summer – Continuation of Swiss projects despite the lockdown

In Switzerland, too, our work for refugee children in asylum centres was no longer possible due to the lockdown. In response, our team quickly developed learning and play sets that were delivered to 100 asylum centres in 19 cantons. This provided families and a total of over 1400 children in asylum centres with activity ideas for the period when play, learning and activity opportunities for children were no longer available in the centres.

August – Emergency aid after explosion in Beirut



The terrible pictures from the devastating explosion in Beirut in early August were seen around the world. Around 100,000 children lost their homes as a result of the disaster. Immediately after the explosion, we worked on reuniting children with their families, as many had become lost in the chaos of the disaster, while also distributing food packages and materials for emergency shelters. We provided psychological support for children and parents to help process the traumatic experiences. In some cases, this was offered in child-friendly pop-up spaces where children had a safe place to play and opportunities to talk.

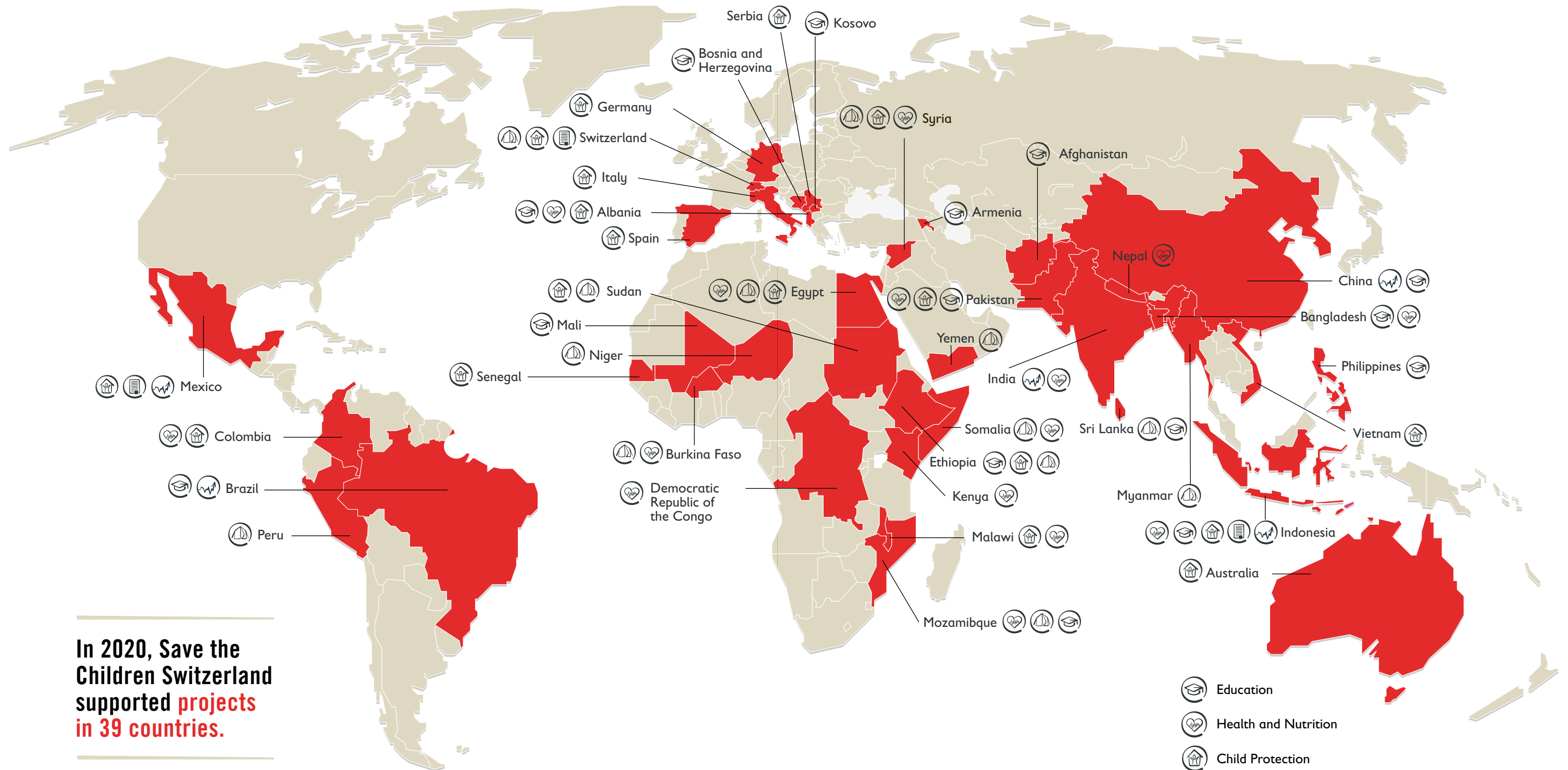


September – a new CEO

As a trained lawyer and with a well-positioned management team, he is developing the strategy and thus setting the future course for Save the Children.

What we achieved in 2020

KENYA

Clever hand-washing station for children in slums

Background

60% of people in Kenya's cities live in slums. Many people live on a daily wage and in cramped conditions without running water, electricity or sewerage systems. Slums are among the areas most affected by Covid-19. In this already challenging situation, Covid-19 control requires exceptional solutions – like the innovative Jengu hand-washing station.

What we do

Together with our partner ARUP, we developed a hand-washing station that ideally meets the needs of local children and families: robust, cost-effective, locally-made, theft-proof, with integrated soap and hygienic operation via foot pedal: the Jengu hand-washing station. Hand-washing with soap remains the most effective and cost-efficient measure to prevent Covid-19 and other infectious or diarrhoeal diseases, thus saving children's lives.

Why the project is important

In slums, where sometimes over a hundred people have to share a single toilet, hygiene is enormously important. Diarrhoeal disease is one of the leading causes of death in children under five, and good hand hygiene is important in controlling the Covid-19 virus. Through the Jengu hand-washing station, we provide an innovative, robust tool to help children and their families protect themselves from infection in a challenging environment.

Early childhood development at home

Background

In Mali, more than a third of school-age children do not attend school. Only 10% of three- to six-year-old children have access to a preschool. Many children who start school drop out early.

What we do

We support children in their early childhood development without building new preschools or spending huge sums operating them. Instead, we ensure that children can be educated at home or in their village. To do this, we organise parenting classes and informal neighbourhood playgroups for over 2500 children in more than 40 villages. This is how we lay the foundation for children's learning and support parents and community members in nurturing their children.

Why the project is important

Early childhood education is extremely important for successful school entry and later educational success. However, this does not necessarily have to take place in a kindergarten or preschool. We use the potential of parents and village communities as the most important sources of support for young children – and have met with overwhelming demand for this service.

Children's Emergency Fund: Fast, flexible, efficient

Background

Save the Children Switzerland holds donations in the Children's Emergency Fund that can be used to provide rapid and immediate assistance following crises and emergencies. Because every hour counts in emergency situations, it is important that we can act quickly and unbureaucratically to save as many children's lives as possible. This is exactly what the Children's Emergency Fund enables us to do.

What we do

We support emergency aid projects for children and families immediately following disasters. In 2020, in addition to Covid-19 aid in Switzerland, China, Germany and six other countries, our missions included famine relief in Burkina Faso, support following a volcanic eruption in the Philippines and emergency aid projects in the war-affected countries of Syria, Yemen and Armenia/Berg-Karabakh.

Why the project is important

Thanks to the Children's Emergency Fund, we were able to respond quickly to 28 crises in 23 countries and supported more than 165,000 people with life-saving aid.



WORLDWIDE

Thanks to the Children's Emergency Fund, we were able to provide assistance in Wuhan in February, when it was the epicentre of the Covid-19 pandemic, supplying health workers and affected families with protective equipment.

Innovation
Our forecasts for future refugee movements

65 MILLION
PEOPLE AROUND THE WORLD ARE DISPLACED DUE TO CONFLICT

Background

More than 65 million people around the world are displaced due to conflict – and over half of them are children. All forecasts indicate that this number will increase significantly by 2030. Refugee children are exposed to numerous risks including abuse, child marriage, recruitment for armed forces or completely missing out on schooling. However, the work of aid organisations is mainly focused on meeting short-term needs rather than providing cost-effective, longer-term investment.

What we do

In an innovative pilot project, we are making use of predictive analysis. This involves using artificial intelligence to learn from past conflict-related refugee crises or movements and making predictions for future refugee movements. Our prototype forecasting model can predict with 75% accuracy how long a crisis affecting more than 25,000 people will last. This allows aid organisations and governments to better plan, prepare, and invest for upcoming crises as effectively as possible.

Why the project is important

By predicting how long a major crisis will last, we can plan targeted, long-term, cost-effective projects and move away from reactive, short-term aid. For children, who represent more than half of the people fleeing armed conflict, this approach gives them the chance of protection, learning and health for their future – despite war and displacement.



Girls supporting girls: Learning groups in the Rohingya refugee camp

Background

In the Rohingya refugee camps of Cox's Bazar, only about 60% of all school-age children have access to education. Young people rarely go to school, and girls are almost entirely excluded from education.

What we do

Girls such as twelve-year-old Ayesha are the focus of our project: both as beneficiaries and as multipliers to pass on their knowledge to other girls. On a voluntary basis, around 500 girls aged 14 and over who attend our special learning and play spaces for girls each form learning groups with two to three other girls. In these groups, they pass on the literacy and numeracy skills that they have learned.

Why the project is important

Girls help girls – and everyone learns something! Even though the capacity of our learning and playing spaces for girls is limited, thanks to our project, girls who would not be able to go to school are able to learn. Their success in learning also increases their self-confidence.



BANGLADESH

Covid-19: Help for the poorest in the pandemic

Background

Lack of testing capacity, high population density and a fragile health system posed a threat to the healthcare of Egypt's population in the Covid-19 pandemic. The impact of the pandemic hit the poorest hard, pushing at least four million into poverty. Children also suffer deeply from the consequences.

What we do

We care for the poorest children and those most affected by the impact of the pandemic, and support them in surviving this crisis. Our project provides additional capacity in the health system by running clinics and educating families on hygiene and preventive healthcare. We also put initiatives in place to support the psychological well-being of children, providing counselling and advice to children via social workers and hotlines.

Why the project is important

Covid-19 hits the poorest hard – and girls and women doubly so, because of their position in society. That is why our project focuses on helping girls and women. In order to cushion not only the health and psychological effects, but also the economic impact, we provide a degree of stability with regular financial support.



EGYPT



CHILD PROTECTION IN THE WAR-TORN NORTHEAST

SYRIA

Background

Children like 14-year-old Maha have spent the last ten years in Syria's embattled northeast experiencing destruction, hardship and deprivation. In camps such as the Al Hol refugee camp, they are exposed to great risks such as child labour or physical abuse, are sometimes separated from their families and have not gone to school for years.

What we do

In the project, we protect refugee children, young people and their families, help them to process what they have experienced and ensure that they can learn. We support children in dealing with the trauma they have experienced, through playful and creative activities. We actively involve children in our project and ensure that they can go to school – and continue to attend. This includes 14-year-old Maha. She goes to school in the Al Hol refugee camp and says: «Going to school in a place like this is a big relief. The teachers are great. I would never have expected this» In our project, we also work directly with unaccompanied children separated from their families and with survivors of child labour, and sexual or physical violence, ensuring that they receive protection and support.

Why the project is important

Feeling safe, play and protection: these three elements are incredibly important for children. Our project combines these factors and ensures that children are protected and can go to school despite the difficult context – and the effects of Covid-19. Despite limited access due to the pandemic, we have continued to make a difference in their lives.

SWITZERLAND



WORK FOR CHILDREN IN THE MIDST OF THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC

Background

The Covid-19 pandemic was challenging for refugee children and young people in Switzerland: together with their families, they had to spend many weeks in quarantine in the asylum centres. They were not able to go to school or employment programmes, support staff were heavily burdened, and our team was not able to continue its advisory activities in the asylum centres.

What we do

We worked remotely to ensure that refugee children are well cared for in the asylum system: more than 1400 children and young people in 18 cantons received seven learning and play sets of 50 pages each with puzzles, drawing, language and maths exercises. ([savethechildren.ch/lernsets](https://www.savethechildren.ch/lernsets)). Additional play and craft materials were also sent to more than 700 families during the lockdown and in quarantine situations. Why the project is important

Refugee children and adolescents are vulnerable to particular risks. Their rights to education, play, recreation and mental health often come up short. Meaningful learning and play opportunities reduce stress and give children a degree of everyday normalcy, joy and childhood during a particularly challenging time.

Save the Children Switzerland was founded in 2006 as an independent association and is politically, ideologically and denominationally independent. The Executive Board of Save the Children Switzerland is responsible for the implementation of the strategy and the operational management and comprises four people from the areas of Executive Board, Global Programs, Philanthropy and Finance & Controlling as of December 31, 2020.

Zewo-certified: transparent and trustworthy

Save the Children Switzerland is Zewo-certified. The Zewo seal of approval is awarded to trustworthy aid organizations and guarantees that donations are used for the intended purpose, economically and effectively. The Zewo Foundation regularly checks compliance with the quality criteria.

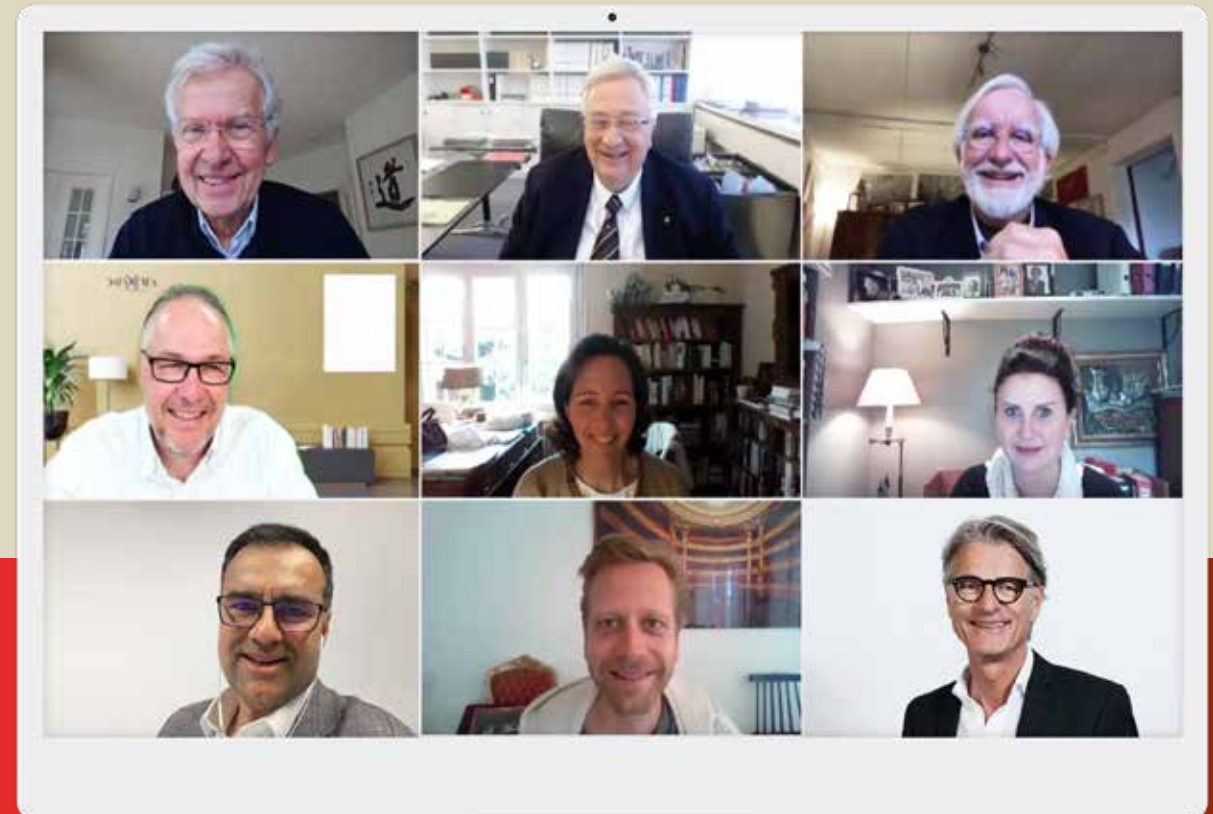

COMMENT ON THE ANNUAL FINANCIAL STATEMENT

We were very impressed by the financial solidarity of our donors in the 2020 financial year. The funding targets of our projects for disadvantaged children were met or exceeded – which was particularly important during the Covid-19 pandemic. Total revenues increased by 11% or CHF 2.5 million to CHF 25 million, with almost no change in fundraising costs. The growth in donations without earmarking is particularly noteworthy. This gave us a lot of flexibility: these donations increased by 17% to CHF 7.1 million compared to 2019.

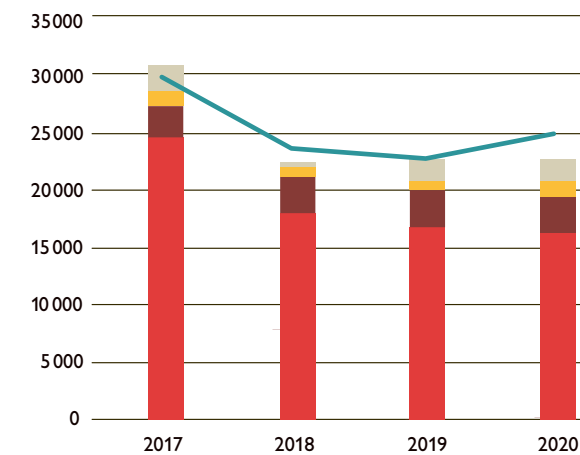
The restrictions due to the Covid-19 pandemic meant that some activities in the project countries were implemented with delays. Therefore, direct project expenses remained almost constant compared to the previous year, although revenues had increased significantly. All unspent earmarked donations have been placed in earmarked funds and will be spent on planned projects in the following year.

Save the Children works very cost-consciously. The total project expenditure in fiscal year 2020 reached 80.6% of the total expenditure – so 80 centimes in every franc go to project work, and 20 centimes are used for fundraising and administration. The figure for the previous year was 80.5%.

In the year under review, the organisation generated a surplus of free funds amounting to CHF 2.4 million, which significantly strengthened the previously insufficient financial reserves. With this, we will be able to ensure that sustainable, needs-oriented projects for children can be carried out even when income fluctuates – in Switzerland and worldwide.

Missions have included aid in Wuhan affected by Covid-19, war-torn regions of Syria and Yemen, and protection for child refugees in Mexico and Bangladesh.



From Switzerland for Switzerland

Thanks to the support of our partners, in 2020 we were able to send seven learning and play sets, each consisting of 40 pages, to over 90 centres and residential facilities in 18 cantons in Switzerland. **In total, more than 1400 children and young people in Switzerland benefited from these.**
