Peace – the basis for a fulfilling life

Peace is more than the absence of war. In the past year, the attack on Ukraine has shown us that peace is not a given. There was major concern across the population which triggered one of the largest waves of solidarity in the history of Save the Children Switzerland. 426 million children worldwide live in conflict zones - they cannot do anything about this and yet suffer the most in the process. They experience physical violence, develop fears through their experiences or lose their homes when they have to flee. To bring peace a step closer, we are making every effort to ensure that children are protected from the effects of war; that children affected by extreme poverty survive and grow up healthy; and that children all over the world receive quality basic education. In Ukraine, for example, we have set up child-friendly bunkers so that the children can forget the war for a moment and just play. After the devastating floods in Pakistan, we distributed hygiene kits for young girls, and in Colombia, we enabled children to return to school with education kits after the COVID-19 pandemic. In our National Programmes, we regularly interact with parents who have fled violence with their

children and are now seeking protection in Switzerland. When we ask them what they want, we hear the same words again and again: Parents want their children to be able to go to school, receive medical care and grow up in safety.

Where states guarantee basic rights such as education, medical care and protection, it sounds peaceful. However, what about the injuries within, from experiences in the home country, when fleeing, or in the host country? This is exactly where we step in, when we carry out projects that focus on mental health. Children need to be able to process their experiences for healthy, liberated development. Inner peace is the breeding ground on which a fulfilling life can grow.







Over 20750 Guardian Angels donated regularly for children.

24,4% Education




Save the Children Switzerland supported projects in 34 countries to protect children, ensure their survival and provide them with education.




We supported 21 asylum shelters in German- and French-speaking Switzerland in setting up child-friendly spaces and other services for children and families.

PROJECT OVERVIEW 2022

In 2022, Save the Children Switzerland quickly and sustainably supported children worldwide. We responded to emergencies such as the war in Ukraine and the floods in Pakistan. At the same time, we were committed to long-term development, such as improving access to education for children in Niger and providing comprehensive protection for refugee children in Switzerland.







What we achieved in 2022

In 2022 Save the Children Switzerland implemented projects in 34 countries.

Life-saving assistance for displaced children

Background

Ukraine is at war. As we have been working in the country since 2014, we were able to immediately expand our outreach with life-saving aid.

What we do

In total, we have reached more than 800,000 people in Ukraine – among them 436,500 children – with emergency aid within the first year. In addition to food and hygiene kits we also distribute heating materials and set up child-friendly spaces. In one of our projects in eastern Ukraine we financially support over 9000 displaced children and their families so that they can meet their basic needs.

Why the project is important

The conflict in Ukraine is forcing millions of people to leave their homes. Many have lost their homes and income and struggle with health problems. In this project, we respond to the basic needs of those affected.

Safe return to school

Background


During the COVID-19 pandemic, schools in Bangladesh were closed for over a year. In addition, families are struggling to regain their financial stability. This combination has put children at risk of dropping out of school and becoming engaged in child labour and child marriage.

What we do

So that children in slums can return to school, we support them with education kits and financial assistance. To catch up with their lost learnings, we provide extra tuition. We also provide training courses for teachers so that they can support children in their learning in the best way possible.

Why the project is important

The project counteracts the long-term consequences of the COVID-19 pandemic for education by allowing children to continue learning in a safe environment.



Access to education for children in crises

Background

In the Diffa region in Niger, the security situation is unstable. Under these circumstances, it is particularly challenging to provide high-quality education for children and to integrate internally displaced and vulnerable children.

What we do

We support local education and child protection actors as well as communities in improving access to quality education for children in Diffa. We show which tools are available to ensure that as many children as possible go to school and can learn in a safe environment in the best way possible.

Why the project is important

By empowering local authorities to use their own skills, children can go to school and learn safely despite volatile conditions.





ITALY

Support for children on the move

Background

A growing number of migrants arrive or transit through the Italian coastal town Ventimiglia. Many of them are children, some of whom are unaccompanied. In addition to the catastrophic living conditions and the limited access to food, clean water and sanitary facilities, unaccompanied children are at particular risk of becoming victims of human trafficking or smuggling.

What we do

We are on the ground and support particularly vulnerable families and unaccompanied children. We distribute hygiene and clothing kits and inform those affected of their rights. In our child-friendly spaces, children receive a hot meal, are looked after by specialists, and can play. In addition, our night shelter provides unaccompanied and separated minors with a safe place to sleep.



Why the project is important

When the children and youth arrive in Ventimiglia, they have already been on the move for four years on average. On their journey, they are exposed to numerous dangers. The project provides safe spaces and basic support to offer protection and dignity to children and their families.

Protection and education for children

Background

In Colombia, the COVID-19 pandemic has hit marginalised populations the hardest. In particular, in communities that are hosting refugees from Venezuela the situation has worsened and violence has increased.

What we do

Schools are safe places that children can return to after the pandemic. To facilitate their return, we provide education kits and financial support. In addition, the prevention of sexual violence is an important component of the project. We increase parents' awareness and offer psychological support. We also improve hygiene conditions in schools to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

Why the project is important

This project enables all children to return to school and provides them with comprehensive protection.



Emergency aid after floods

Background


This year, Pakistan was hit by the heaviest rainfall in decades. 16 million children have been affected by the devastating floods and the risk of disease and hunger has sharply increased in the flooded regions.

What we do

We distribute food, hygiene and household kits in the province of Sindh, which was most heavily affected by the floods. Furthermore, we provide those affected with training courses on hand washing and the safe storage of water and carry out first aid sessions.

Why the project is important

The floods in Pakistan have caused a humanitarian crisis. We are helping those affected to mitigate the impact of the crisis and live a life of dignity.







SWITZERLAND



KIJUMA A magazine by young editors living in asylum centres

Background

Almost half of all applications for asylum in Switzerland come from children and young people. The proportion of young people who are fleeing alone has also sharply increased in the last year. Unaccompanied minors are particularly vulnerable and urgently need support in dealing with their current situation in Swiss asylum centres.

What we do

In a new project entitled «Kijuma – Children and youth magazine», young people living in asylum centres become editors and develop their own digital magazine during a project week. They discuss their experiences in the centres as well as their concerns, interests and wishes. The work on the magazine is supplemented with sports and creative activities.


Why the project is important

The right of children to participate¹ is seldom taken into account in the Swiss asylum system. Through the magazine, young people have the opportunity to present their views and the reality of their lives to a wide audience. In addition, they can formulate concerns directly to the asylum centres to bring about improvements in their everyday lives.

pose. Save the Children was already heavily involved in Ukraine before the outbreak of war this year, so we were able to allocate 90% of these donations to corresponding projects by the end of the year. Furthermore, we were able to raise a further CHF 4,4 million from institutional donors for specific projects in Ukraine. In total, we received contributions and earmarked donations amounting to CHF 22,0 million in 2022, 15% more than in the previous year.


In addition, we were generously supported by donations that were not earmarked. These increased by 32% over the previous year to CHF 9,4 million. This enables us to fund programmes that receive less public attention. They also help to cover the necessary adorganisation, allowing us us to respond quickly in emergencies and acute crises.

In the reporting year, we received more earmarked payments than funds went out to the projects. In accordance with regulations, the difference was allocated to the fund capital, which increased by CHF 2,5 million. With the fund capital we will cover future project expenses.

In total, 78,3% of our funds go to project work. This percentage is slightly below the previous year's figure of 81,5%. We expect this percentage to rise again in the future as the fund capital goes to projects.


