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
Thanks to the Children's Emergency Fund, we were able to start helping families quickly after a disaster and stay to help them rebuild and recover.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

WE HELPED OVER 256'000 PEOPLE

In 2024, we reached over 256'000 people with the allocation of nearly 1.7 million of Swiss francs from our Children's Emergency Fund in 11 humanitarian crises.

In a year of escalating crises and complex humanitarian needs, the commitment of our Children's Emergency Fund remained unwavering.

2024 was marked by longer-lasting crises and unpredictable and extreme weather events such as wildfires in Peru, cyclones in Malawi and flooding in Nigeria. Complex and protracted conflicts, such as those in the Middle East, Ukraine and Sudan; population movement driven by political and economic instability; and devastating heatwaves and tropical storms were only a few of the crises that children and their families faced.

In 2024, the Fund continued its strategic support to 'forgotten emergencies' allocating over 1 million to underfunded crises often not covered by the media. Last year, we also collaborated with local partners in 5 emergencies and, thanks to our initial allocations, we have also been able to leverage an additional funding of over 4.8 million Swiss francs.

None of this would be possible without the support of our partners. Flexible donations help get resources quickly where they are needed the most, providing children with the support they need to survive, grow and succeed.

Your support to our Fund is a key enabler in ensuring the timely provision of humanitarian aid to children and families across the globe.



¹ Depending on each crisis and on the humanitarian response needs, we might decide to allocate donations under CHF 5'000 to other similar humanitarian crises worldwide. By doing that, we are able to support humanitarian responses that are not covered by global and Swiss media and hence remain often underfunded - we call them "forgotten crises".

FORGOTTEN EMERGENCIES

Last year, the CEF allocated over 1 million Swiss francs to 'forgotten emergencies'. The Fund continued to support 'forgotten crises' that have limited coverage in the media and where our Fund contribution can have a bigger impact for children and families.

Thanks to the allocation from our Children's Emergency Fund, we were able to support over 10'000 beneficiaries allowing them to continue their primary education in Ntcheu District, in Malawi, where school buildings had been badly damaged by the recent Cyclone Chido.

It was reported that the cyclone, occurred in December 2024, caused roof damage to houses, schools, and public buildings across 17 districts, affecting over 45'000 people.

So, despite a challenging context, due to the Cyclone emergency, with destructive winds and significant rainfall, and to other recurrent shocks, this initiative allowed children to continue their learning in a hard-to-reach area.

In particular, our allocation was helpful in rebuilding and rehabilitating a school damaged by the cyclone, while also providing learning materials to primary school children.





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
